We are also called to be callers of sheep and this is what we have been doing with these evangelistic series.

- The evangelistic series have moved to our home church, we have had 15-25 people attending each night with 4-10 who are new to our community. Last Saturday night Michael asked for people who are interested in baptism. Several said yes. We are still working on a date sometime in May.
- Several of our young people will be baptized Sabbath May 2.
- The contract of Kylee Gumm, our Bible worker has really helped to further the Kingdom of God in our church. Her initial contract was to end on May 1. The church board has voted to extend it 6 months.
- We will have a Church business meeting on May 11 at 7:00 pm to address two items: A proposed new cell phone antenna contract, and going to a 2 year nominating committee cycle for church officers. There is a separate document that addresses these in some detail.
- We have started the nominating committee process so you should expect one or more calls about helping in the church family for the coming year.

Pastor Search

There has been some activity by the conference in this area. There were discussions (at the conference level) with a new candidate that did not pan out. There will be another conference personnel committee meeting in the next week or two and I am expecting some further action at that time.

There are a number of church members who are looking for work, who are struggling with health and family issues. Please keep our church members in your daily prayers.

Mountain View Central – Church Business Meeting

Tuesday, May 11

7:00 pm

There are two issues that need to be voted on:

1. A proposal to install a 2nd cell phone antenna in the steeple
2. A move to go to a 2 year nominating committee cycle.

CELL PHONE ANTENNA

Approximately 5 years ago the church entered into a contract with Cingular to install a cell phone antenna and associated equipment in the steeple and storage area next to the chapel. Initially the contract was for \$2,000 per month. Approximately two years ago it was renegotiated to \$1,200. That equipment was subsequently sold to T-mobile and remains in place. There was some conflict with the neighbors who were concerned about the possible health effects of the radio waves.

AT & T has approached us about adding a second tower at a proposed rate of \$2,000 per month. After reviewing the proposal with the finance committee and the church board we voted to move forward on exploring the opportunity. Last week AT & T did a site inspection and they are very interested in moving forward. There are a number of steps still to take place: City permits, enter into a contract and approval by both the Church in business session and the conference.

The current room used to house the T-mobile equipment is not large enough to accommodate the A T & T equipment. Their plan is to enclose the walkway that is east of the chapel to house the equipment. All the costs of modifications and the cost of power will be paid by A T & T.

Church members will be asked to empower the Church Board or it's designee's to finalize the negotiations and complete the contract with A T & T.

NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Each year the church creates a nominating committee and selects new officers for the coming year. It is a very time and energy consuming process. Then about 80% of the officers continue in the same position the following year. A number of years ago the world church adopted an alternate process where the nominating committee meets every other year, and in the interim serves as a personnel committee to address vacancies and other personnel issues.

The church board is recommending that we adopt this two-year cycle feeling that it will not consume as much energy each year.

He felt that he was a sinner, and his great need led to an outburst of passionate desire, “God be merciful to me a sinner.”

THE WHIPPING

There was a school with a class of students that no teacher had been able to handle. Two or three teachers had been run off from this school in one year by the unruly students. A young man, just out of college, heard about the class and applied to the school. The principal asked the young man, 'Do you know what you are asking for? No one else has been able to handle these students. You are just asking for a terrible beating'. After a few moments silent prayer, the young man looked at the principal and said, 'Sir, with your consent I accept the challenge. Just give me a trial basis.'
